Mphahlele was born in Marabastad, Pretoria, on December 17th 1919. His parents sent him to Maupaneng, near Polokwane, to go and live with his paternal grandmother. He came back to Marabastad to start school and received his high school education at St. Peter's College, Rossetenville.

ES'KIA MPHAHLELE AND 'DECOLONISING EDUCATION' IN SOUTH AFRICA

Mphahlele grew up in Pretoria and attended St. Peter's Secondary School in Rossetenville and Adams Teachers Training College in Natal. His early career as a teacher of English and Afrikaans was terminated by the government because of his strong opposition to the highly restrictive Bantu Education Act.

Es'kia Mphahlele (17 December 1919 – 27 October 2008) was a South African writer, educationist, artist and activist celebrated as the Father of African Humanism and one of the founding figures of modern African literature. He was given the name Ezekiel Mphahlele at birth but changed his name to Es'kia in 1977.

From 1957 to 1987, Mphahlele lived in exile, having first become a member of the ANC, but later disassociating himself from the organisation. He lived in Kenya, Zambia, France and the USA, and, like several other illustrious black South Africans – including Njabulo Ndebele – studied at the University of Denver, where he received a PhD.
