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### **Excavations At Tell El Balamun**

Excavation in Egypt at Tell el-Balamun. This archaeological excavation in Egypt was designed to recover the history of a major site in the Egyptian Nile Delta. This region between Cairo and the Mediterranean is archaeologically rich but not as well known as the sites of southern Egypt. The excavation is one of a number which are bringing to light the lost ancient cities in this part of Egypt.

It was once a port city on an estuary of the Nile, but is now inland of the Mediterranean Sea. In Classical times it was known as Diospolis Inferior. It has a complex of temples.
